San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo to once again feature Texas-size rodeo action as part of the Wrangler ProRodeo Winter Tour

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. - For the sixth time in seven years, the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour's winter series makes a visit to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, winner of the 2005 PRCA Large Indoor Rodeo Committee of the Year.

The sport's top cowboys and cowgirls will battle it out at the state-of-the-art SBC Center for key Wrangler Tour points in their efforts to qualify for the Pace Picante ProRodeo Chute-out, May 13-14 in Tulsa, Okla.

Each regular Tour rodeo is one of the top rodeos in the country and contestants earn Tour points based on his/her performance at each Tour stop. Fans can catch all the Tour action on Fox Sports Network (FSN) for the first time in history. Each stop will be televised on FSN within 10 days of the event. Check local listings for times in your area, or log onto www.prorodeo.com or www.prorodeotour.com for the latest TV listings.

In 2005, longtime executive director

Keith Martin of the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo elevated his rodeo to mini-Wrangler NFR status and in 2006 he has taken it a step further. This year's event features the top 70 contestants in each event, down from the normal 210. Each contestant will compete three times in a back-to-back format, with the top 12 in each event advancing to the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour set for Sunday, Feb. 19, at 2 p.m. CT.

The top stock will once again be featured this year with approximately 16 PRCA stock contractors providing the best stock the business has to offer. All this produces a better competition for the cowboys, stock contractors and fans.

The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo follows the Wrangler Tour's first three stops in Odessa, Texas, Denver and Rapid City, S.D. The Tour resumes Feb. 25 at the San Angelo (Texas) Stock Show and Rodeo and continues the next day with the Tour round of La Fiesta de los Vaqueros in Tucson, Ariz.

Nokes wrestles his way to the winner's circle in Rapid City

RAPID CITY, S.D. - It had always been a dream of all-around cowboy Garrett Nokes of McCook, Neb., to qualify for the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo. In 2005, Nokes fulfilled that dream, competing in the steer wrestling. His goals for 2006 are to return to Las Vegas to not only try and win a world title in steer wrestling, but possibly to be a contender for the all-around title.

Nokes, 30, picked up the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour and average titles in steer wrestling at the Black Hills Stock Show & Rodeo over the weekend in Rapid City, S.D. He also claimed the rodeo's all-around title.

Nokes rode Chad Van Campen's horse, Caesar, to the winner's circle after posting a blistering 4.1-second run on the U.S. Smokeless Tobacco Co. scoreboard Sunday afternoon. The run was quick enough to put him atop the leader-

board in the average with a total time of 13.4 seconds on three head.

"I drew two really good steers," said Nokes, after the victory. "I kind of messed the first one up and ended up second in the round with a 3.8. My second one ran really hard and wasn't quite as good of a steer but I felt like I made a good run on him. Today I had one of the two best steers in the pen, so I just wanted to make sure I got out (of the box clean) and threw him down as fast as I could. Honestly, I feel like I should have been a little quicker on him, but it was quick enough."

Nokes gives credit to Van Campen's horse, Caesar, for his recent success.

"I owe all my checks this past year to that horse," said Nokes of Caesar. "I was on the verge of maybe even retiring from the sport at the begin-

- ▶ **High flying action gets national attention.** Bullfighter Cory Wall was sent flying over the chutes by a bull from the Rafter G Rodeo string, known as Captain Chaos, on Jan. 30, at the Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show in Fort Worth, Texas. Little did Wall, of Burlington, Colo., know that his flying through the air episode would bring so much national attention.

The in-house video crew for the rodeo captured the flight and then promptly sent it out to all the major news networks. ABC's *Good Morning America*, CBS's *The Early Show*, ESPN's *Sportscenter*, *Inside Edition* and various Fox News affiliates have all run the footage. Wall has also received calls from the *Maury Povich Show* and *Spike TV*, who are both interested in doing something.

Wall has been a busy man inside and outside of the arena since that day. He has done live interviews with *Inside Edition*, which aired on Jan. 31, and *The Early Show* with Julie Chen, on the morning of Feb. 1. He was part of the Top 10 plays on Sportscenter, coming in at No. 7.

"It has been a whirlwind around here," Wall said. "It has been pretty crazy, but a great opportunity for me to get the word out about rodeo and what I do for a living."

Bull rider Chad Castillo had just been thrown from the bull and was moving away when the bull, Captain Chaos, started towards him. Wall stepped in to get the bull's attention and put his hand between its horns. That is when the bull sent Wall flying about 12 feet over the bucking chutes.

When asked if it was painful, Wall said, "It didn't hurt at all. It was more comical than anything. Last year in this same arena, I was sent flying about 15 feet in the air, but it was in the middle of the arena and I landed on my head. That one hurt."

- ▶ **Bull riding DVDs available.** ProRodeo Films, the official video and distribution and licensing company of the PRCA, has produced two bull riding DVDs that will be distributed by TimeLife Video. World champion bull riders Terry Don West, Tuff Hedeman and Cody Hancock are scheduled to sign autographs at the location as part of the in-store promotion.

- ▶ **The Bullying Hurts Program.** For the past two years High School FFA students in the State of Colorado have been presenting an anti-bullying program better known as "Bullying Hurts," in their area elementary classrooms. Adams of Colorado Springs has written a theme song for Bullying Hurts, titled *Helping Hand* and will be introduced for the first time at this special event.

ning of last year, but then after getting on Caesar for the first time in Denver last year and placing second, and then coming here to Rapid City and taking second, I changed my mind. Now to come back this year and ride him to victory is great, and he is the reason for my success. He won 1-2-3 here this year, and there is a reason for that. He is the best horse here in this little arena and he works great in any situation. He is 19-years old and I just hope he keeps working for quite a while."

Caesar was ridden to a 1-2-3 finish in the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour round. Besides Nokes, Dane Hanna of Denver, Colo., rode him for a second place finish with a time of 5.0-seconds and owner, Van Campen of Granada, Colo., finished in a tie for third with a time of 5.3 seconds.

Nokes picked up his first all-around title of the 2006 season after winning \$4,848 in steer wrestling and tie-down roping.

The Black Hills Stock Show & Rodeo marked the third stop on the 2006 Wrangler ProRodeo Winter Tour. Contestants not only compete for money at the Tour rodeos, but for valuable Tour points that qualify them for the Pace Picante ProRodeo Chute-out upon the conclusion of the Winter Tour.

The Pace Chute-out will be held May 13-14 in Tulsa, Okla. All 12 stops on the Winter Tour will be televised on Fox Sports Network for the first time in history. Check local listings for times in your area.

Tie-down roper Mike Johnson also picked up a big win in Rapid City, winning the average with a total time of 27.6 seconds on three head.

Johnson, of Henryetta, Okla., competed at his 20th Wrangler NFR in 2005 and looks to return again this year. After pulling his groin at the Wrangler NFR, Johnson has been meticulous about his health and tried not to come back to soon. Rapid City was a good test for him.

"I hadn't been up here for a few years and since I missed Odessa (Texas) with my groin injury, I figured this would be a good test," Johnson said. "I felt like I had been practicing good and I wanted to get started at some of these rodeos that were indoors and a little smaller before I started going full blast down the arena at a rodeo like Red Bluff (Calif.) or Guymon (Okla.). This is a great rodeo. I have always enjoyed coming up here and now I am glad I did."

Winning the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour round in the tie-down roping was Scott Kormos of Teague, Texas, who stopped the clock in 8.2 seconds. Kormos picked up 12 Tour points for the win and finished second in the average with a time of 28.4 seconds, picking up and additional seven Tour points.

South Dakota bareback rider Tigh Anderberg didn't know much about the young horse Metal Round out of the Kesler Rodeo string, but knew if it was a Kesler horse that it would buck and would give him a chance to win. Anderberg, of Moberg, not only spurred the horse to the Tour round win, but to the average win as well. He scored 88 points to lead the field and finished with 172 points on two head.

"I didn't know that horse at all," Anderberg said. "It was a colt of Kesler's, so I figured it

would be pretty good. Anytime you draw a Kesler horse you know it is going to buck, so I was pretty fortunate to get on a Kesler horse today and lucky it all worked out for me."

There were some new faces in the team roping winner's circle in Rapid City. The team of Paul Beckett of Laramie, Wyo., and Adam Worthen of Black Forest, Colo., made the rodeo world sit up and take notice on Sunday afternoon, when they stopped the clock in 5.9 seconds to win the Wrangler Tour round. Beckett and Worthen also captured the average title with a total time of 22.5 seconds on three head. In just their second rodeo as partners, they picked up some valuable Tour points and sizeable paychecks.

The saddle bronc riding Tour round victory was shared by Canadian Rod Hay and Utah's Stormy Sagers. Hay, of Wildwood, Alberta, rode Sutton Rodeo's Justin Peppers, while Sagers rode Kesler Rodeo's Smiling Cat for 83 points to win the round.

For Hay, it was his first two horses back from shoulder surgery that he had following the 2005 Wrangler NFR, and for Sagers, it was a confidence booster to not only make the Tour round but to win it. Joaquin Real of Ojai, Calif., picked up the average win with 162 points on two head, just one point ahead of Hay and Sagers.

Barrel racer Andrea Jones was overcome with emotion after winning her first Tour round and average title in Rapid City. Jones, of Twin Falls, Idaho, stopped the clock in 12.38 seconds to outdistance the rest of the field in the Tour round and won the average with a total time of 37.56 seconds on three runs. Jones finished ahead of June Holman of Arcadia, Neb., in both the Tour and average race. Holeman, who made history in 2005 by becoming the oldest person to compete at the Wrangler NFR at the age of 62, finished with a 12.50-second run in the Tour round and 37.73 seconds on three for the average. Jones works full-time as a physical therapist and is a mother of two. Her brother is Wrangler NFR saddle bronc riding qualifier Rusty Allen of Lehi, Utah, and her husband, Pete, is a tie-down roper.

2004 World Champion Bull Rider Dustin Elliott has revamped his goals for 2006 and is ready to regain the world title. Elliott, of North Platte, Neb., picked up his first Wrangler ProRodeo Tour victory with an 87-point ride on Burns Rodeo's Smoke 'n Ashes at the Black Hills Stock Show & Rodeo. He also won the average with 170 points on two head. It was Elliott's second bull riding victory in Rapid City in as many weeks. He won the Division 2 Xtreme Bull Riding title on Jan. 27 and returned on Feb. 5 to win the rodeo.

"I went to college less than 100 miles from here and in our college days we used to come up here and watch this rodeo and I was always thinking that I wish I could ride here," Elliott said. "Now I have not only gotten to compete here, but now I have won it and it feels pretty good. I have been here twice. The first year, I just got drilled so this is the first year riding a bull for the full eight seconds in this arena and it felt pretty good."

The next Wrangler ProRodeo Tour stop will be the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo on Feb. 19 in San Antonio, Texas.

Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show comes to a close after 30 performances

FORT WORTH, Texas. - It was a busy but memorable run during the Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show in Fort Worth, Texas. The World's Original Indoor Rodeo hosted its 110th edition of 30 performances for more than 950,000 fans. Add 1,250 bucking horses, 1,000 of ProRodeo's rankest bulls and 1,093 contestants, and the combination makes for action-packed competition. The event, which paid out over \$480,000, began on Jan. 20 and came to a close on Feb. 5.

Bareback rider Zach Dishman finished atop the leaderboard with 389 points on five head. Dishman, of Beaumont, Texas, picked up a check totaling \$8,377, moving him to fourth in the world standings.

"I did well on my first rides, so maybe it was meant to be since I drew a hard-to-ride one in the final round," said Dishman, after scoring just 70 points on his final round horse, Rooster, of the Frontier Rodeo Company. "He was the kind of horse that doesn't make the sport a lot of fun. I'd like to have ridden better, but I was thankful to get by him."

2005 World Tie-Down Roping Champion Fred Whitfield knew he had eleven seconds to play with entering the final round. World Champion All-Around Cowboy Ryan Jarrett was close behind him, but Whitfield, 38, knew what he had to do in order to take control of the top spot in Fort Worth.

"When you've got a lead, all you have to do is rope the calf, throw it down, and get a check," Whitfield said.

Whitfield, of Hockley, Texas, tied his calf in 9.6 seconds, finishing third in the short round behind Jarrett, of Summerville, Ga., and Wrangler NFR qualifier Cash Myers of Athens, Texas. Whitfield won the first round with a time of 8.2 seconds en route to the average title with a total time of 27.4 seconds on three head. Whitfield pocketed \$12,752 to take over the lead in the world standings.

Steer wrestler Gabe Ledoux of Kaplan, La., held his

own while wrestling his three steers in 13.1 seconds.

Ledoux, 25, finished out of the money earnings in the first round, but quickly regained strength in order to finish third in the second round, stopping the clock in 3.7 seconds, and placed third in the short round with a 4.3-second run. Ledoux earned \$11,558 during the competition and is ranked second in the world standings with \$11,939.

2005 World Champion team ropers Clay Tryan and Patrick Smith won the inaugural team roping title after roping two steers in 9.9 seconds. Tryan, of Billings, Mont., and Smith, of Midland, Texas, picked up checks worth \$7,116. They tied for fourth in the first round with a run of 5.2 seconds and returned for the second round to post a 4.7-second run, good for third place.

In 2005, the PRCA Board of Directors voted to make team roping a standard event at all PRCA sanctioned rodeos. This was the first year for Fort Worth to have team roping, and it was held prior to the start of the regular rodeo in Terrell, Texas.

Other average winners in Fort Worth included Cody DeMoss, Heflin, La., saddle bronc riding, 323 on four head, \$11,296; Kelly Maben, Spur, Texas, barrel racing, 51.31 seconds on three runs, \$10,553; and Wesley Silcox, Payson, Utah, bull riding, 172 points on two head, \$12,858.
