Wrangler Tour finishes first stop in Reno

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – The first of 12 rodeos on the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour's summer series comes to an end on June 24 at the Reno Rodeo. The weeklong rodeo started June 18 and culminates with the Wrangler Tour round, scheduled for 7 p.m. PT on June 24.

Fox Sports Network (FSN) will broadcast highlights from the Reno Rodeo Tour Round. Check your local cable listings for a time and date in your area.

Since 1919, the best cowboys and cowgirls in the world have converged on Reno for its annual rodeo. It is recognized as the start of the Fourth of July run, otherwise known as Cowboy Christmas, a string of lucrative rodeos across North America that runs through the Independence Day holiday. From June 21-July 4, a total of 60 PRCA-sanctioned events will take place from Davie, Fla., to Williams Lake, British Columbia, and many points in between.

Aside from being one of the highest-paying events in ProRodeo, the Reno Rodeo also gives cowboys and cowgirls their first chance at earning Wrangler Tour points in hopes of qualifying for the ProRodeo Summer Tour Finale, Sept. 28-

30 in Omaha, Neb. Only the top 12 contestants in each event's Tour standings following the final Tour stop in Albuquerque, N.M., on Sept. 23 qualify for the Pace Challenge.

Success in Reno, historically, bodes well for the rest of the season. It did in 2005.

In last year's Reno Rodeo, six of the seven event winners ultimately qualified for the Pace Picante ProRodeo Challenge in Omaha, Neb.

In addition, those event champions – bareback rider Royce Ford of Briggsdale, Colo.; steer wrestler Todd Suhn of Brighton, Colo.; team ropers Steve Purcella of Hereford, Texas/Britt Bockius of Claremore, Okla., saddle bronc rider Cody DeMoss of Heflin, La., tie-down roper Monty Lewis of Hereford, Texas; bull rider Dustin Elliott of North Platte, Neb.; and barrel racer Linda Vick of Hesperia, Calif., all used their Reno paychecks as a springboard to the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo.

Sylvester to announce run for Colo. governor

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – Chuck Sylvester, a former three-term member of the PRCA Board of Directors and longtime general manager of the National Western Stock Show and Rodeo in Denver, on June 20 will officially announce his candidacy for governor of Colorado at his ranch near La Salle, Colo.

Sylvester, who turns 69 on June 20, served as rodeo committee director on the PRCA Board. He was the general manager of the National Western from 1978-2003 and watched the rodeo's attendance more than triple during his tenure. Also during that

time, the rodeo committee's efforts were recognized three times (1997, 2000, 2001) with the prestigious title of PRCA Indoor Committee of the Year.

Sylvester recently filed the necessary paperwork with the Secretary of State to become a Republican write-in candidate in November.

Rodeo News and Notes

- ▶ **Harris sets records in Reno.** J.W. Harris of May, Texas, set a Reno (Nev.) Rodeo and Dodge Xtreme Bulls record with a 96-point ride aboard Flying U Rodeo's Werewolf on June 15 to win the title at the *Dodge Xtreme Bulls Ride Hard Tour*, presented by B & W Trailer Hitches.

Harris won both the semifinal and final rounds of the tour stop and won \$17,258 after scoring 188.5 points on two head. He earlier scored 92.5 points in the semifinals.

Traveling partner Sonny Murphy of Herriman, Utah, scored 94 points early in the final round. Harris drew Growney Brothers Rodeo's Wild Side but was awarded a re-ride due to inferior stock following a sub-par bucking performance, according to the judges.

Then Harris drew Werewolf, and the two teamed for a record-breaking ride. Harris and Murphy were the only two of the 15 finalists to record a qualified ride in the finals.

In the semifinals, 2000 World Champion Cody Hancock of Taylor, Ariz., finished second with 89 points. Steve Woolsey of Payson, Utah, and Jerry Shepherd of Nephi, Utah, tied for third with 86.5 points, and Bryan Richardson of Dallas, Texas, rounded out the top five with an 86.

- ▶ **Drury scholarship.** Jyme Peterson, who competes in goat tying at Montana State-Bozeman, was the recipient of the first Shane Drury Scholarship on June 16 during the College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyo.

The scholarship award was tied in with the rodeo's Tough Enough to Wear Pink promotion, in which cowboys and cowgirls wore pink, and portions of the ticket sales went to the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation.

Drury, a 2000 National Finals Rodeo qualifier, has been battling cancer.

- ▶ **Summer Finale tickets.** Tickets for the Summer ProRodeo Tour Finale, Sept. 28-30 at the Qwest Center in Omaha, Neb., are now on sale. The event features the top contestants of the Summer Wrangler ProRodeo Tour.

Tickets start at just \$15 and include admission to nightly concerts featuring Diamond Rio (Sept. 28), Big & Rich, featuring Cowboy Troy (Sept. 29) and Sugarland (Sept. 30).

Innisfail win puts Harris on top

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – Three-time Wrangler National Finals Rodeo bareback riding qualifier Chris Harris of Itasca, Texas, started his summer run in winning fashion at the 46th Annual Daines Ranch Rodeo in Innisfail, Alberta.

Harris scored 87 points aboard Peters and Sons Rodeo's Gold Dust and earned \$4,196. In doing so, Harris improved from No. 3 to No. 1 in the world bareback riding standings, leapfrogging both reigning world champion Will Lowe of Canyon, Texas, and previous leader Andy Martinez of Pavillion, Wyo.

Cody DeMoss of Heflin, La., the world standings leader in saddle bronc riding, added to his lead in Innisfail.

DeMoss rode Peters and Sons Rodeo's Classic Angel for 85 points and \$6,677.

Steer wrestler Barry Kreikemeyer of West Point, Neb., placed second in the first round, split the title in the second and claimed the average title. He recorded a time of 7.6 seconds to win the crown and \$6,713.

Team roping brothers Randon and Jason Adams of Logandale, Nev., won a round and placed third in another en route to the average title. The tandem roped two steers in 11.1 seconds and pocketed \$5,587 apiece.

Other Innisfail champions were Jody Turner, Cochrane, Alberta, bull riding, 87.5 points on Girltetz Rodeo's Wait a Minute, \$5,324; Nate Steinberg, Conroe, Texas, tie-down roping, 15.7 seconds on two head, \$5,635; and Joleen Seitz, Savona, British Columbia, barrel racing, 33.75 seconds on two runs, \$4,868.

Londo defends all-around title at CNFR

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – Ben Londo, a junior at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, defended his all-around title at the College National Finals Rodeo, which concluded June 17 in Casper, Wyo.

Londo, who qualified in bareback and saddle bronc riding, finished with 220 points.

West Texas A&M won its first rodeo national championship by winning the men's title. Weber State claimed the women's team crown.

Kirby Eppert of Tarleton State University won not only the women's all-around title, but honors as the event's

rookie all-around champion.

Other college national champions were Jerad Schlegal, Vernon (Texas) College, bareback riding; Zach Cobb, West Texas A&M, steer wrestling; Chance Means, Central Arizona College/Matt Garza, New Mexico State, team roping; Jarrett Monroe, Montana-Western, saddle bronc riding; Matt Prichard, Wharton County (Texas) Junior College, tie-down roping; Jarrod Craig, Hill (Texas) College; bull riding; Adriane Kochie, Wisconsin-Platteville, barrel racing; Jessica Painter, National American, breakaway roping; and Kayla Nelson, Wyoming, goat tying.
