# 'Grand' entry

## San Francisco makes Wrangler Tour debut

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – The 2007 Wrangler ProRodeo Tour heads to new territory when the Grand National Rodeo Horse and Stock Show in San Francisco plays host to the eighth stop of the 21-venue Tour. The eight-performance rodeo starts April 6-7 at the Cow Palace in nearby Daly City, then resumes April 9 and finishes with the final three shows from April 12-14.

In 2006, the Grand National changed six decades of tradition by moving its rodeo from November to the spring season. The event had been one of the final PRCA rodeos of the season, often the last chance for cowboys and cowgirls to earn money for qualification to the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo. After years of trying to compete with the Oakland A's, San Francisco 49ers, Halloween and other assorted oddities in the late fall, officials with the Grand National Rodeo in 2005 decided to stop battling the calendar.

The rodeo took a year off in 2005 to accommodate the date change. After holding its last November rodeo in 2004, the new era of spring rodeo started on April 7, 2006.

For the next two weekends in San Francisco, cowboys and cowgirls will not only compete for part of a purse that exceeded \$230,000 in 2006, but earnings that apply toward the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour and inclusion into the newly formed playoff system later this summer. This year's Wrangler Tour consists of 21 rodeos through August. Contestants can choose 15 out of the 21 rodeos to count toward their official Tour Rodeo count.

At the conclusion of the 21st rodeo, the top 35 contestants in total Tour money and the "wild card," event champions from the Dodge National Circuit Finals Rodeo, will move on to the first Tour Championship event Aug. 14-18 in Caldwell, Idaho.

## Nifty 50: Mesquite Championship Rodeo celebrates milestone anniversary

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – What do Mick Jagger, Chuck Norris, bucking bull Kowabunga, Priscilla Presley, Roger Staubach, Kelly Kaminski and the late President Ronald Reagan have in common?

They all have been to the Mesquite Championship Rodeo. The famous Texas rodeo has been attracting world leaders, celebrities, professional and circuit cowboys and cowgirls and thousands of rodeo fans since 1958.

Mesquite Championship Rodeo organizers, participants and fans will celebrate its 50th season when the weekly rodeo series kicks off on April 6 at the Resistol Arena. While some PRCA rodeos are held for a weekend or a week or two, the Mesquite Championship Rodeo is held on Friday and Saturday nights for six months. The

rodeo series wraps up on Sept. 29.

Mesquite, a suburb of Dallas, became a hotbed for rodeo thanks to the driving force of its founders and organizers, its close proximity to a booming metropolitan area and its access to a pair of major airports. The Texas legislature proclaimed the city of Mesquite the "Rodeo Capital of Texas" in 1993.

The impact of the Mesquite rodeo went well beyond the Texas borders because of its national, and later regional, weekly television broadcasts dating back to the late 1970s. The rodeo was broadcast on ESPN and The Nashville Network and now can be found on Fox Sports Southwest. The Mesquite Championship Rodeo has introduced the sport to many first-time fans, many

## Rodeo News and Notes

- ▶ **Brother of world champion dies in accident.** Shawn Johnson, the older brother of 2003 World Champion Steer Wrestler Teddy Johnson, died March 29 after the truck in which he was driving rolled on Rabbit Ears Pass near Steamboat Springs, Colo. He was 32.

According to a release from the Colorado State Patrol, Johnson was driving a white Dodge Ram truck hauling a trailer loaded with building materials west on U.S. Highway 40 near mile marker 141 when he lost control coming around a left-hand curve and began to roll the truck.

A funeral is scheduled for Wednesday, April 4 at 2 p.m. (CT) at the First Baptist Church in Checotah, Okla.

"They said he was coming down a steep grade, and his brakes gave out," Teddy Johnson said. "He couldn't make the sharp turn at the bottom ... He was one of the biggest impressions on me. He started bulldogging first and inspired me to do it. If you talk to the guys around here, he was considered one of the most talented bulldoggers around. He just wanted to start a family and didn't want to compete anymore."

Shawn Johnson joined the PRCA in 1993 and nearly qualified for the National Finals Rodeo in 1998, finishing 20th and winning the Reno (Nev.) Rodeo steer wrestling average title along the way.

He is survived by his two daughters, Kaylee and Lotti.

Last year, Shawn Johnson started his own company, Diamond J Transporting, which build barns and delivers them to their destination. Johnson was hauling a pre-made barn to Craig, Colo., at the time of the accident.

- ▶ **Akin injury update.** Bull rider Lee Akin, seriously injured March 8 at the Southeastern Livestock Exposition and Rodeo in Montgomery, Ala., recently was removed from a medically induced coma, is breathing on his own and has responded to commands.

"This Tuesday we saw good movement, movement that was on command," said his wife, Mary, on a message board on [www.thebreeder-connection.com](http://www.thebreeder-connection.com), which is holding the third and final benefit auction this week. "Lee pointed one finger, then two fingers for the nurse. He also opened his eyes on command. Although these seem like really small tasks, they are really big in this situation. The fact that Lee heard the command, understood the command, asked his body to do it and he did it is a large step."

The first auction brought in \$12,465.

The Web site also is accepting cash donations to help defray the medical bills for Akin, who remains in critical condition at Baptist Hospital in Montgomery, Ala., after sustaining a traumatic brain injury March 8 during the Southeastern Livestock Exposition and Rodeo in Montgomery. Akin, of Weatherford, Okla., was bucked off the bull Dick Dasteredly of Smith, Harper and Morgan and the bull stepped on his head.

# PRCA extends deal with Coors

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. - The Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association recently signed a two-year contract extension with Coors Brewing Company that will keep Coors "The Banquet Beer" as the official beer of the PRCA.

The two-year deal, which runs through the end of 2008, includes an option for a third year. The extension will also keep Coors as the title sponsor of the PRCA's Coors Man in the Can award, an honor it has sponsored since 1984 that is given each year to the association's top barrelman.

Coors has been a sponsor in ProRodeo since 1980 and has been the official beer of the PRCA since 1987. The 134-year-old Colorado-based brewing company has sponsorship presence at more than 350 of the PRCA's 650 rodeos.

It's that longevity and deep entrenchment in the rodeo industry that fueled the contract extension, according to Coors' National

Sponsorship Manager David Wilson.

"Given our Rocky Mountain heritage and deep roots in the West, this is a great partnership for Coors. We're proud to continue our association and relationship with the PRCA, as well as the local rodeos we sponsor, the (Wrangler) NFR and the PRCA membership," Wilson said.

The PRCA was enthusiastic about the contract renewal.

"Coors has always been one of the PRCA's most supportive sponsors and one of the most sophisticated marketers in the industry, with considerable strength at the grass-roots level," said Greg Rieber, executive vice president of PRCA Properties. "This renewal illustrates that the PRCA has core partners who continue to see value in aligning their brands with the PRCA and the Western lifestyle. We look forward to many more years with Coors as one of our key partners in growing the sport."

## Gorsuch jumpstarts season in Laughlin

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. - Dean Gorsuch, the reigning world champion steer wrestler, enjoyed his finest weekend in 2007 after capturing the average title at the Laughlin (Nev.) River Stampede, which concluded April 1.

Gorsuch of Gering, Neb., who had earned just \$6,580 during the first three months of the season, started his April in style, turfing two steers in 9.2 seconds and earning \$4,350 in the process. He finished ahead of Teddy Johnson of Checotah, Okla., the 2003 world champion steer wrestler who had a two-head

time of 9.9 seconds.

Other champions in Laughlin were bareback rider Jess Davis of Payson, Utah, 88 points, \$5,807; saddle bronc rider Bradley Harter of Weatherford, Texas, 83 points, \$5,957; bull rider Cooper Kanngiesser of Zenda, Kan., 89 points, \$5,643; tie-down roper Tyson Durfey of Colbert, Wash., 17.4 seconds on two head, \$3,429; team ropers Shain Sproul of Benson, Ariz./Dennis Gatz of Modesto, Calif., 9.8 seconds on two head, \$5,272 each; and barrel racer Abby Davis of Adrian, Ore., 17.29 seconds, \$4,441.

watching from their couches on a Sunday night.

"Everybody across the country would get it (on TV), and even people who didn't grow up in a rodeo-oriented place knew the Mesquite Rodeo," said Kaminski, a two-time world champion barrel racer. "I had an uncle who lived up in Illinois, and I remember that when I first went pro he said 'Are you going to ride in Mesquite?' and I said 'Yes, I am.' That was kind of neat. Someone like him, someone who didn't know anything about rodeo, knew about Mesquite."

The Mesquite Championship Rodeo did more than help build the sport's fan base. Cowboys and cowgirls fine-tuned their skills at the weekly rodeo.

"You can go there on any weekend and

there's going to be circuit cowboys and cowgirls, and there's going to be world champions," Kaminski said. "You just never know who is going to show up, and that's what makes it fun."

Along with rodeo action, the Mesquite Championship Rodeo features chuck wagon races, bull poker, pony rides for children, a petting zoo, a calf scramble and a grand entry fans may participate in. Children may also register for the mutton busting. Spectators can stroll through Wild Bill's Western Store and eat at Sonny Bryan's BBQ Pavilion.

Resistol Arena seats up to 5,300 for the general public and offers a third-floor ring of private Champion Suites for parties and corporate entertaining.
