# Fantastic four

## Playoffs finalized for Wrangler Tour finish

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – The highly anticipated Wrangler ProRodeo Tour's playoff system is set for 2007, and all eyes will point to the Caldwell (Idaho) Night Rodeo as a total of 288 contestants will start a four-rodeo, 16-performance journey there in hopes of standing alone as champion at the end.

At the end of a grueling 21-event Tour rodeo gauntlet, the top 35 contestants in each event (35 teams in team roping) will advance to the Playoff Series, which begin at in Caldwell, Aug. 14-18. They will be joined in Caldwell by event champions from the 2007 Dodge National Circuit Finals Rodeo, who were awarded berths in the Playoff Series as "Wild Cards."

Contestants will be jostling for position during the 21-event Wrangler ProRodeo Tour in hopes of qualifying for the Playoff Series. They can count 15 of those 21 rodeos toward the Tour standings, which consists of money

won at Tour rodeos.

Following Caldwell's five performances, the top 22 contestants in each event in the overall Tour standings, along with Caldwell's event champions and the DNCFR Wild Cards, move on to the Puyallup (Wash.) Fair & Pro Rodeo, Sept. 7-9. After duking it out during Puyallup's five performances, the Playoff Series field will be cut to the top 12 contestants and top 12 team roping teams based on the overall Tour standings.

After three performances in Omaha, Sept. 27-29, the top 10 contestants in each event and top 10 team roping teams advance to the Championship of the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour, which will be held in early November in Dallas. The Tour Championship will conclude with three performances in Dallas, Nov. 9-11, with the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour champions

## 'Back' in the saddle: *DeMoss rules roost at Rodeo Austin*

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – Cody DeMoss' back is back.

Barely able to walk under his own power last Dec. 7 after suffering fractures to three lumbar vertebra transverse processes in his lower back at the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo, DeMoss took it easy during the first two months of the year. While he rode a saddle bronc or two, he concentrated on team roping while his back injury healed.

At last weekend's Rodeo Austin (Texas), DeMoss, of Heflin, La., proclaimed his full-time return to riding saddle broncs. By placing in all three rounds and winning the aggregate title by nine points, DeMoss earned a rodeo-best \$11,146 and took a major step in the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour standings as he quickly made up for missing the first six Tour rodeos.

This year's Wrangler ProRodeo Tour consists of 21 rodeos from January to August.

Contestants will choose 15 out of the 21 rodeos to count toward their official Tour Rodeo count and will compete for money this year versus points as in years past.

At the conclusion of the 21st rodeo, the top 35 contestants in total Tour money and the "wild card," event champions from the Dodge National Circuit Finals Rodeo, will move on to the first Tour Championship event in Caldwell, Idaho.

In Austin's first round, DeMoss scored 85 points aboard Andrews Rodeo's Chilie Willie, splitting a first-place check (\$2,873) with Cody Wright of Milford, Utah. DeMoss added an 84-point ride in the second round, good for second

► **Commissioner search begins.** At its March 20 meeting at PRCA Headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colo., the PRCA Board of Directors took initial steps toward finding a new Commissioner of the PRCA. The Board has hired a consultant to spearhead the search and is also enlisting the services of a selection committee to help with the process. ► **Auctions benefit Akin.** The first of three online benefit auctions for seriously injured bull rider Lee Akin brought in \$12,465, according to Nate Morrison of [www.thebreedersconnection.com](http://www.thebreedersconnection.com).

The high-selling lot consisted of two embryos with paternal bloodlines to the stellar bull Big Bucks, which were donated by Don Brown and sold to Sadie Bonsall for \$2,000.

A second auction was completed March 24, while another gets under way on March 27 and continues through March 31 until 8 p.m. CT.

The Web site also is accepting cash donations to help defray the medical bills for Akin, who remains in critical condition at Baptist Hospital in Montgomery, Ala., after sustaining a traumatic brain injury March 8 during the Southeastern Livestock Exposition and Rodeo in Montgomery. Akin, of Weatherford, Okla., was bucked off the bull Dick Dasteredly of Smith, Harper and Morgan and the bull stepped on his head.

Akin has undergone two surgeries and remains in a medically induced coma.

► **Hall of Fame gets donation.** Benny Binion's World Famous National Finals Rodeo Bucking Horse and Bull Sale recently made a \$20,000 donation to the ProRodeo Hall of Fame. Of the \$20,000, \$6,000 came via the sale of the Wrangler NFR bucking chutes, which are sold every three years. That donation, which was presented to ProRodeo Hall of Fame Executive Director Tana Kimble by PRCA Co-Director of Rodeo Administration John Davis, came shortly after Brenda Binion Michael made an additional \$20,000 donation at the end of 2006.

place, and an 83-point effort in Saturday's Wrangler ProRodeo Tour round that put the finishing touches on a dominating victory. Matt Hebbert of Hyannis, Neb., and Scott Keogh of Whitt, Texas, finished in a distant second-place tie with 243 points.

Texans enjoyed ample success at Rodeo Austin, the fourth of five stops in the Lone Star State on the Wrangler Tour – the Buc Days Pro Rodeo in Corpus Christi, April 25-28 is the last Texas venue. Bareback rider Chris Harris of Itasca, Texas, finished fourth in the Wrangler Tour Round but hung on to win the average title by a mere one point over Tour-Round winner and 2004 World Champion Bareback Rider Kelly Timberman of Mills, Wyo. Harris earned \$8,060.

Bull rider Bryan Richardson of Dallas turned in the best ride of Saturday's Wrangler Tour Round, an 85-point effort aboard Beutler and Son Rodeo's Wimpy 2 – one of only three qualified rides – to carry him to a two-head total of 170 points, just one point ahead of Tag Elliott of Thatcher, Utah. Richardson picked up a quick \$10,655.

Texas team ropers Travis Tryan (Chico) and Michael Jones (Hico) put the exclamation point on a successful week by winning Saturday's Wrangler Tour round with a time of 5.8 seconds. The duo won the average title by nearly a second over Joe Beaver and Nick Simmons. For their efforts, Tryan and Jones each earned \$5,805.

Texan barrel racer Annesa Self of Valley View parlayed a Tour-Round victory into an average title. Self completed the cloverleaf pattern Saturday in 14.79 seconds and finished with the best three-run total of the 82-racer field at 44.95 seconds.

Texan tie-down roper Cade Swor of Chico didn't make any noise in the early rounds at Rodeo Austin. While he recorded two solid times to qualify for the Tour Round, he hadn't earned a check. That changed when

he won the Tour Round in a sizzling time of 7.9 seconds, carrying him all the way to the top. His three-head time of 26.6 seconds edged Stran Smith – who was making an early return from major shoulder surgery last November – by one-tenth of a second. Swor earned \$4,536.

Another timed-event cowboy who made a big splash Saturday was steer wrestler Levi Wisness. The Keene, N.D., cowboy surged to the top of the leaderboard, just in time, with a dramatic 3.2-second run in the Wrangler Tour Round that rallied him past 2005 World Champion Steer Wrestler Lee Graves by just two-tenths of a second. By recording a time of 12.3 seconds on three head, Wisness earned \$4,652.

being crowned.

"We're very excited about the new Playoff Series system for the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour," said Keith Martin, Chairman of the PRCA Board. "This system provides great opportunities for PRCA and PWBR contestants to compete at the highest level and to do so in front of a nationally televised audience. The Playoff Series will put the perfect finishing touches on another successful Wrangler ProRodeo Tour season and will build ample excitement for rodeo fans heading into the Wrangler NFR."

The new Playoff Series format provides great opportunities for a variety of PRCA

contestants - from weekend circuit cowboys to world champions – to achieve big paydays and glory on a national scale in front of a televised audience. Beginning Aug. 31 and running each week until the start of the Wrangler NFR on Dec. 6, the Playoff Series will be televised on Fox Sports Network and CBS.

FSN will broadcast hour-long shows featuring the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour Playoff Series each week for 14 straight weeks, as well as a minimum of 14 additional hours of re-aired broadcasts. CBS will broadcast Dallas' final round on Nov. 17 at 2 p.m. ET, providing an exclamation point for the culmination of the Tour on a national

scene.

Steve Rempelos of ProRodeo Tour LLC, which has licensed the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour, is excited about the new format for the Tour's culminating events.

"This provides a broad opportunity to PRCA members that, from a grassroots side, may only be surpassed by the DNCFR," Rempelos said. "We can focus attention on the top stars and follow them week to week and follow them through the 14-week process. This system gives us access to the top stars at times when the TV production trucks are there on-site. This is great for the membership."
