It's bigger in Texas

RodeoHouston debuts bracket format, large final prize to further elevate status

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – It's kind of like March Madness – rodeo style.

So get out your brackets out and start your office pools, because RodeoHouston's new format will keep fans on their toes to the very end, wondering which cowboys will take home a monster \$50,000 pay-check.

In an effort to attract more fans, make a multi-round rodeo easier to track and understand and to help deserving cowboys pocket some fat checks, the \$1.2 million event changed its format this year to a bracket system. After several rounds, the top four contestants in each event will advance to a final bonus round, where the winner will

receive a \$50,000 check that will count toward the PRCA world standings.

"One of the real problems in the sport of rodeo is that nobody knows who is winning or losing when you have rounds that last from day one to day 18," said Skip Wagner, president of RodeoHouston. "But this way, after a few performances, we'll know who advances.

"The idea really came from trying to look at our customer, a very urban audience, and how we could better present the sport of rodeo to them with a format and terminology they're used to from other sports."

Knowing that most people understand,

Tour not quiet on Western front

Stars shine bright in Tucson

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – Four-time world champion all-around cowboy Trevor Brazile is a big fan of Tucson's rodeo, and rightfully so. Brazile of Decatur, Texas, captured his second consecutive tie-down roping average title at the 82nd annual La Fiesta de los Vaqueros in front of a packed house of 11,000 on Feb. 25.

Brazile, 30, entered the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour Round with more than a half-second lead in the average on two and knew a good solid run would be enough to defend his title in Tucson.

"The calf I had today, they were 14.7 on yesterday and that wasn't what I wanted to hear when I showed up today," Brazile said. "I

Ohl claims San Angelo win

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – Five-time and reigning world champion tie-down roper Cody Ohl entered the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour Round at the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo knowing if he made a businessman's run, he would win the average title an overall prize totaling more than \$6,000.

Ohl of Hico, Texas, stopped the clock in 9.3 seconds to finish with a four-head total of 34.1 seconds, capturing the average title. His closest competitors were Scott Kormos, who finished second in 35.2 seconds, and Jerome Schneeberger was third with a 35.3.

Schneeberger of Ponca City, Okla., won the Tour Round, stopping the clock in 8.0 seconds. Ohl left the Concho Valley with \$10,041 in

- ▶ **PRCA re-launches Web site.** The PRCA's Web site, www.prorodeo.com, was re-launched on Feb. 26, so look for the brand-new look in the upcoming days. The new design, featuring ProRodeo's signature red and blue, was designed by SportsGraphics of Indianapolis. The PRCA staff manages and updates the site throughout the year.

Since 2003, www.prorodeo.com was housed by ESPN and was part of the ESPN.com family. The site was managed and updated by Winner Communications in Tulsa, Okla.

The new design is easier to navigate and contains the same information as the old site, such as feature stories, world standings and competitor bios.

New things to look for are a video vault, featuring one-click multimedia and video highlights. There is a "PRCA in the News" link to mainstream media articles.

An enhanced members-only section provides contestants and committees an electronic version of PRCA Business and guidelines for putting on a successful PRCA rodeo.

During the 2006 Wrangler National Finals Rodeo, the site received nearly 6 million page views.

- ▶ **Lowe garners honor.** Three-time and reigning World Champion Bareback Rider Will Lowe was honored recently during the annual Texas Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony in Amarillo, Texas.

Lowe, of Canyon, Texas, was honored with a Special Achievement Award after winning his third world title in five years. Lowe grew up in Olathe, Kan., but bought his first house just outside of Canyon in 2003.

Joining Lowe in the special achievement category was the West Texas A&M Rodeo team, which won its first national collegiate rodeo title at the 2006 College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyo.

- ▶ **CNFR announces 2007 dates.** The 58th annual College National Finals Rodeo will be June 10-16 in Casper, Wyo. National titles in saddle bronc riding, bareback riding, bull riding, steer wrestling, tie-down roping, team roping, barrel racing, breakaway roping and goat tying will be up for grabs.

The top three students in each event, and the top two men's and women's teams from the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association's 11 regions will qualify for the CNFR. Students will compete for more than \$200,000 in scholarships from the U.S. Smokeless Tobacco Company.

knew I had a pretty good cushion so I just went out and made as good of a run as I could."

Brazile turned in an 11.1-second run today, which didn't win the round but was enough to secure the title over Doug Pharr of Victoria, Texas. Brazile's final time was 30.6 seconds on three head, while Pharr finished with a total time of 31.3.

La Fiesta de los Vaqueros marked the sixth stop on the 2007 Wrangler ProRodeo Tour. This year's Wrangler ProRodeo Tour consists of 21 rodeos from January to August. Contestants will choose 15 out of the 21 rodeos to count toward their official Tour Rodeo count and will compete for money this year versus points as in years past.

At the conclusion of the 21st rodeo, the top 35 contestants in total Tour money and the "wild card," event champions from the Dodge National Circuit Finals Rodeo, will move on to the first Tour Championship event. From there, the top 22 in total Tour money, as well as the wild card from the DNBCFR and the champion from the first Tour Championship event will advance to the field of 24 to the second Tour Championship event. At the conclusion of that rodeo, the field will be cut to 12, then to eight and finally to four. The Championship sites will be released at a later date. Fox Sports Network and CBS are scheduled to televise the Championship events.

Winning the Lynn Beutler All-Around Award and the bareback riding average was Cody DeMers. DeMers of Kimberly, Idaho, started the day with a bang, riding Beutler and Son Rodeo's Southpoint for 87 points to finish with the high-marked ride of the day. After all 12 cowboys had ridden, it was DeMers who was alone atop the leaderboard with 169 points on two head.

The last couple of weeks have been good for another two-event cowboy. Josh Peek of Pueblo, Colo., competes in the steer wrestling and tie-down roping. A week ago, Peek won the tie-down roping title in San Antonio, and on Sunday in Tucson, he won the steer wrestling title for the second time in his career. Peek turfed three steers in 18.2 seconds, adding another \$5,786 to his steer wrestling and all-around earnings for 2007.

Saddle bronc rider Rod Hay had been having a pretty quiet winter until this week. Hay of Wildwood, Alberta, finished second at the San Angelo (Texas) Stock Show and Rodeo and a day later took top honors in Tucson with a two-head score of 170 points. He also turned in the high mark of the day in Tucson with an 86-point ride on Beutler and

Son Rodeo's Many Bubbles. Hay, who pocketed \$4,630 in San Angelo, added \$8,461 in Tucson.

It was a rough day for the team ropers in Tucson, but when it was all said and done, a pair of tie-down ropers topped the leaderboard. Blair Burk and Clint Robinson stopped the clock in a time of 8.6 seconds to win the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour Round and captured their first Tucson team roping average title with a 22.2-second total on three head. Burk, of Durant, Okla., and Robinson, of Spanish Fork, Utah, spend most of their time competing in the tie-down roping but entered the Tucson rodeo in both events and it was the team roping where they shined. They each picked up checks worth \$4,516.

Brittany Pozzi-Pharr and her horse Stitch have been a force to reckon with this year. Pozzi-Pharr of Victoria, Texas, added yet another win to her 2007 highlights, winning the average in Tucson with a three-run total of 53.14 and a total of \$4,973.

The bulls were the big winners in Tucson during the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour Round, bucking off all but one cowboy. The lone rider was rookie and College of Southern Idaho student Tag Elliott, who posted a 79-point ride on Beutler and Son Rodeo's Wall Cloud. Elliott of Thatcher, Utah, finished the rodeo with 159 points on two head and picked up \$5,579 in earnings.

earnings, while Kormos added \$8,644 to his season total and Schneeberger cashed in for \$8,740.

The San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo marked the fifth stop on the 2007 Wrangler ProRodeo Tour. This year's Wrangler ProRodeo Tour consists of 21 rodeos from January to August. Steer wrestler Bryan Fields set the arena-record in the first round and didn't look back. Fields, who has battled through rodeo burnout and having a healthy horse the last couple of years, burst back onto the rodeo scene in fine fashion on Feb. 12 when he set an arena-record with a 2.9-second run. The 35-year old from Alvin, Texas, is no stranger to fast runs. His 3.0-second effort in the 2001 Wrangler NFR tied the arena record with ProRodeo Hall of Famer Steve Duhon.

When the dust had settled after four rounds of competition, Fields found himself atop the leaderboard with a total time of 16.6 seconds. The time was just one-tenth of a second faster than Wade Sumpster of Fowler, Colo., who won the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour Round with a quick-time of 3.7 seconds to secure his second-place spot in the average. Fields pocketed checks worth \$7,424.

Bareback rider Tom McFarland led the way in San Angelo, finishing with 245 points on three head. McFarland of Wickenburg, Ariz., won the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour Round with an 86-point ride aboard Cervi Championship's Phoenix Vest to capture the title. McFarland, a member of the "Wolf Pack" team that consists of Will Lowe, Wes Stevenson and Royce Ford, won \$4,426. Lowe and Stevenson finished third and fifth, respectively, in the average.

Anthony Bello finished atop the leaderboard in the saddle bronc riding with 168 points on two head. Bello of Oakley, Utah,

rode Cervi Championship's Sister In Law for 81 points in the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour Round to finish in a tie for third. Rod Hay of Wildwood, Alberta, won the Tour Round with an 85 on Cervi Championship's Easy Street.

Tee Woolman and Cory Petska took top honors in the team roping with a four-head total of 23.6 seconds. Woolman of Llano, Texas, and Petska of Lexington, Okla., outdistanced Tommy Edens and Coby Jones, who finished with a 24.0.

Shelly Anzick jockeyed her way to the top of the leaderboard in San Angelo after turning in the winning run of 13.99 seconds in the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour Round. Anzick of Livingston, Mont., won the three-run average and \$8,407 with a total time of 43.17 seconds.

It was a tie atop the leaderboard in the bull riding with Tyler Johnston and Zeb Lanham each tallying 173 points on two head. Johnston of Bridger, Mont., rode Cervi & Guidry's Multi-Chem Hot Damn for 91 points and the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour-Round victory. Lanham of Sweet, Idaho, was close on his heels in the Tour Round with an 87 on Vitalix Backdraft. Johnston picked up checks totaling \$4,288, while Lanham earned \$5,402.

and enjoy, the bracket-type format used in the collegiate basketball tournament, RodeoHouston officials decided on a similar idea. The kicker? To give an additional \$50,000 (\$27,500 each in team roping) to the shoot-out round winner in each event.

"The \$50,000 gets everyone's attention, but we're actually paying out more money (total) than we did last year even if you take that away," Wagner said.

The rodeo will begin with five individual "super series" rodeos that will be three rounds each. The top 47 cowboys from last years' world standings, plus three randomly-drawn medical exemptions qualify for entry into the super series rodeos, and there will be 10 competitors in each event per super series rodeo.

After three performances, the top four contestants in the average in each event advance to the semifinals, where scores will be zeroed. Those 20 semifinals contestants will be randomly split into two groups of 10 each for a second semifinal round.

The top four cowboys in each 10-man group from the semifinals (eight total) will advance to the final round and scores again will be zeroed. However, the cowboys who placed fifth through 10th in the semifinals will have one last shot to advance, competing in one more wild-card round. The top two contestants from that wild-card round will advance to the finals, bringing the total number of cowboys in each event in the finals to 10.

After a single round of competition in the finals, the top four contestants will advance to a "shoot-out round," and that winner will receive the \$50,000 check.

"In the past, there were 67 guys, so you were competing against 66 others," said Kelly Wardell, PRCA Board of Directors member. "This will make for a better rodeo. I think it's exciting, and I appreciate them stepping up and trying to do something different."

The PRCA Board of Directors had to approve RodeoHouston's format change, particularly because officials wanted the \$50,000 bonus to count toward the PRCA's world standings.

"People have the opinion that if you win \$50,000 in Houston, then you potentially qualify for the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo," Wagner said. "In the end, someone is going to almost punch their ticket to Vegas, but there are still 14 other slots to be competed for."

Bareback rider Riddle prepares for first DNCFR

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – Rodeo competitor, trick rider, stock contractor, secretary, timer – when it comes to rodeo, you name it, and Caine Riddle probably has a family member that does it.

Riddle himself is a bareback rider, and although he didn't start riding until after high school, he's family's rodeo roots run deep. He said he can't remember a time growing up that he wasn't involved in rodeo, so it only made sense that he eventually climbed aboard a bucking animal and started doing it himself.

And he's shown that he's good at it too. Riddle will attend the Dodge National Circuit Finals Rodeo next month for the first time after finishing as the Prairie Circuit's 2006 year-end bareback riding champion.

Riddle said he's excited about going to the DNCFR and experiencing the Tour Finale-type atmosphere there.

"I've never been and I'm pretty excited about it," Riddle said. "Everyone's told me it's pretty much like one of those Finales, that we'll get on some really good stock and everybody's told me I'll fill my pockets. So I'm pretty excited about that."

He's probably getting plenty of advice from his assorted rodeo-involved family members. There are his parents, Rusty, an eight-time National Finals Rodeo qualifier in bareback riding, and Dollie, a former trick rider; his sister, Melissa Navarre, a

trick rider; brother-in-law Corey Navarre, who rides bulls in the PRCA; uncle and stock contractor Bennie Beutler; aunt Vickie Shireman, a PRCA secretary; cousin and timer Jennie Murray and her husband, Dustin, also a PRCA bareback rider.

"I didn't really start riding until I got out of high school, but I was always involved in it and enjoyed it," Riddle, of Vernon, Texas, said. "It was just something that I was always around."

Riddle was a high school football player, and after he graduated he said he "needed something to do" so he started riding bareback horses. He enrolled in Tarleton State University and in December he received his agriculture degree, so now he can concentrate all his time and energy on rodeo.

Last year he competed in the Prairie Circuit, but this year he's made the switch to the Texas Circuit. Changing circuits will help him get to a lot of circuit rodeos, he said, because Riddle plans to go hard this year and hit the large rodeos in pursuit of a Wrangler National Finals Rodeo berth.

Riddle said he plans to try and compete in both the DNCFR and RodeoHouston next month, although the rounds overlap. If he does well in both, he'll have to choose where to continue on.

"Hopefully I'll have a decision to make," he said. "That's my main goal, to have to make a decision whether to go to the last round there or go back to Houston."
